Course Description

The first half will cover an exploration of the First Peoples' history and culture and give students the tools to be part of the Truth and Reconciliation process. They will be shown the history and issues leading to this day and the current situation through texts, films, other literary art forms. In the second half, students will be shown different media through which indigenous people can communicate and indigenous topics can be discussed and be encouraged to explore communication. They will recognize the ever-changing world and how language, culture, and history evolve.

Course Overview:

Торіс	Course Content		
Introduction to First Peoples and Narratives	Students will explore various writings in the 'CRITR' Workbook. They will learn to discern bias and reflect on their own understanding of issues and how they learn (metacognitive strategies).		
Indigenous Novels, Plays & Humour	Students will read <i>The Marrow Thieves</i> and understand the colonial and post-colonial perspective and analyze the portrayal of indigenous people (including stereotypes).		
Indigenous Poetry	For the poetry unit, students will be reading poems and analyzing techniques that poets use to convey meaning. There will be a focus on analyzing the meaning as well as the role of poetic devices in conveying the poem's meaning/theme. Students will individually or collaboratively create a poem with indigenous words, context, meaning, and messages.		
Indigenous Films	Students will analyze film techniques as well as the role of storytelling in indigenous-made films through the film <i>Reel Injun</i> . They will continue to develop their ability to assess accuracy, reliability, bias, and authenticity.
